Style of Presentation (4 Choices)

- 1. A narrow topic, minimum 10 minute PowerPoint, Keynote, or similar presentation on your topic
 - This presentation must include the following
 - i. Maps, charts, graphs, etc.
 - ii. Images related to the subjects
 - iii.Thorough overview of the selected subject(s)
 - iv.Interactive quiz or game based (maximum 5 minutes) on the presentation (time not included in the presentation) This can be but is not limited to web-based activities. (NO KAHOOT!)
- 2. A serious (attempt and attitude) 8 minute or more, recorded news style report (video or audio) on your topic (Must be filmed and/or recorded outside of class)
 - Students must include a coherent, 30-45 second, student created movie trailer as a commercial during their broadcast. The movie theme must revolve around the topic's subject matter.

Style of Presentation (4 Choices)

- 3. A <u>well-designed</u> minimum 15 page, *illustrated* "children's" book that the main ideas associated with your topic.
 - This activity must include a children's cereal based on your book with an attractive and representative prototype of the box.
 - Students will read their book in a cozy story-time setting and present their cereal.
- 4. Students may also choose to develop a lesson that differs from choices 1-3. Groups must be prepared to discuss their ideas with me for approval on Monday or Tuesday.

Important Information and Advice to Presenters

Quality of presentation to the class is as important as the effort you made to create it. If your group does not present in a prepared, mature manner it will hurt your overall score.

Face the class

Know your information

Reading directly from the board is annoying to all of us

Speak so we can hear you

Pay attention to your audience

If you encourage foolish behavior expect foolish behavior. This will negatively impact your score

An <u>appropriate balance</u> of interesting, informative, and funny is important

Your group is responsible for keeping the class on task

Scores for your presentation will be available after all presentations are complete.
